Program Accreditation

The PSP has applied for eligibility for accreditation from the WASC Senior College and University Commission (WSCUC). WSCUC has reviewed the application and determined that the graduate school is eligible to proceed with an application for Candidacy and Initial Accreditation. A determination of Eligibility is not a formal status with the WSCUC, nor does it ensure eventual accreditation. It is a preliminary finding that the institution is potentially accreditable and can proceed within five years of its eligibility determination to be reviewed for Candidacy or Initial Accreditation status with the Commission. The decision to pursue accreditation at this level has been driven by the California State legislation that now requires all degree-granting institutions to obtain regional accreditation by 2020. Currently, the PSP is approved by the State of California.

Program Philosophy

This doctoral program was designed to ensure that graduates are capable of providing quality professional services; critically evaluate the efficacy of such services; and contribute to the advancement of the field of group psychotherapy. Because all program faculty are regarded as experts in the field, they will serve as role models to students in these diverse ways. Our program is intentionally kept small to allow us to maintain close student-faculty and student-advisor relationships in both teaching and practical experiences.

The Digital Component

In order to have a group of faculty experts from across the country and the world, the program will be delivered online. However, unlike other online training programs, the group psychotherapy doctoral program offers all of their classes live, which means that students must sign-on at the scheduled time for each instruction. The platform on which the class is taught allows each student to see and interact with the instructor and each of their peers through video and audio. The platform is easy to use and it allows for meaningful class discussions. Courses and some requirements, such as the doctoral dissertation, are mostly directed to students' development of theoretically based approaches.

The In-Person Component

Once a year, students in the program will be expected to travel for two weeks to Sacramento, California for a face-to-face (F2F), intensive and practical training experience. Students in the program will be exposed to a variety of experiential modules during this time. In addition, the goals of practicums; experiential groups; attendance to the American Group Psychotherapy Association (AGPA)'s annual meeting; and other similar experiences bear more directly on students' development of practical skills in the facilitation of group psychotherapy.
